PROJECT UPDATE

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is working with state and local partners to complete a critical missing link in the 275 mile Coast to Coast Trail known as the South Sumter Connector Trail. This segment of the trail is proposed to connect the 22-mile gap between the recently completed Good Neighbor Trail in Hernando County (scheduled for completion in 2018) and the Van Fleet Trail in Sumter County (see map).

The goal of the Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study is to identify a specific route and concept for the trail that minimizes impacts to the surrounding environment and receive input from Sumter County, local governments, residents and other stakeholders, such as the Withlacoochee State Forest.

Currently, only the final design phase is funded - the right of way phase and construction phase are not funded. The overall project development process is shown on the next page.



The route identified in a 2016 study starts where the Good Neighbor Trail ends just west of the Withlacoochee River, crosses the river on a new pedestrian bridge, passes under Interstate 75 and connects to County Road 673 just east of Interstate 75. From that point, the route of the trail is proposed to follow County Road 673 to U.S. Highway 301, then proceed north to County Road 478, where it will continue east into the Town of Webster and connect to State Road 471. At State Road 471, the trail will head south along the roadway and connect with State Road 50, ultimately providing a connection to the Van Fleet Trail.

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
PD&E STUDY PROCESS

A PD&E Study is a process conducted by the FDOT that meets state and federal requirements put into place as part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969. This process involves a combination of planning, engineering analysis, environmental analysis, public

outreach and documentation. The end result is a project that meets the transportation need while minimizing impacts to the environment. These results are then carried forward into the final design phase, where construction plans are produced.

WHERE ARE WE NOW? WHAT'S NEXT?

The FDOT has been collecting data, analyzing the conditions in the study area and the potential environmental impacts, developing viable engineering alternatives, and analyzing the preliminary impacts associated with those alternatives. Based on the information collected and the analysis done to date, as well as the comments received from the public, local leaders and agencies, a preferred alternative will be selected. Once the preferred alternative has been approved, the project will move into the final design phase.
